THE COOKBOOK IS SIMMERING

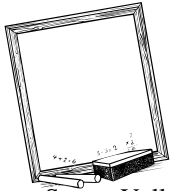

ON THE BLACKBOARD

Billing Parents

Scotts Valley, CA has come up with a new plan to lower children's absences from school. It is billing parents \$36.13 per absence day to reimburse schools for the loss of state attendance money. Parents are requested but not required to pay. In this affluent district, students often miss class to go on family vacations to Disneyland, Hawaii and resorts.

One parent happily paid the bill for taking his two children on a 5-day trip, commenting that it was a bargain compared to private school tuition. Another parent was angry, saying she was not going to be told to pay when her "kids" were absent. It certainly is a novel approach, no?

Enrollment Drop

LAUSD needs some way to stem its lower enrollment numbers, that mean millions of state dollars will be lost this year. San Fernando Valley schools will really suffer as new inner city schools draw away 50% of the students presently bussed to the Valley.

Schools lose not only regular attendance funding but also Title I federal funds granted to educate low-income and disadvantaged students. It is reported that last year's enrollment at Taft High School in Woodland Hills dropped from 3,500 to 2,995. Principals are seeking solutions to the expected funding squeeze, considering charter status and more private fundraising. It's doubtful that a version of Scotts Valley plan would be adopted in L.A.. Do you have any new ideas?

College Rise

In contrast to LAUSD, Cal State University officials predict its 23 campuses will average a 2.5% annual growth through 2011. Cal State University, Northridge saw a 4% rise in its enrollment, from 33,243 last year to 34,560 this past fall. Most

of the record number was due to transfer students from local community colleges. CSUN recruiters worked hard, using personal visits, phone calls and follow-up e-mails to high schools. They paid off. At the present time, Cal State Fullerton leads the system with the largest enrollment of 35,040 students.

Low Turnout

Concern about public education did not translate in voter turnout in the last election that was to choose the leaders of LAUSD. The actual turnout was 7% of registered voters in L.A., the lowest in over 20 years. Only 128,516 voters cared enough to cast ballots. Now a runoff election will determine whether the UTLA candidate or the developer-backed candidate wins, establishing the majority vote on the Board. How many will vote this time? It's a toss-up as to who will win or who really cares about educating students. The District has many difficult problems for the LAUSD to face.

Teacher Shortage

The goal of No Child Left Behind, President Bush's education plan, was to have all student proficient in reading and math by 2014. This goal is hampered by the critical shortage of science and math teachers. The Center for the Future of Teaching and Learning found nearly 50% of the state's new math and science teachers start out unprepared. Last year the Center predicted that the state would face a shortage of 100,000 teachers over the next 10 years. CA legislators have increased support of internship programs and eased the process for out-of-state teachers to get CA credentials. The state has budgeted \$2.9 billion to the lowest performing third of schools, increased the number of teachers and forced districts to place more experienced teachers at all their schools. We hope the results will be positive.

lowing.

1. In 1998, she authored a resolution that awarded a 35 year lease to a Korean-owned group to put a golf driving range at Los Angeles City College that has killed all outdoor sports.

2. In 1998, she convinced all six board members to sell the taxpayer owned district headquarters at 4050 Wilshire Boulevard to a group from the country and Bank of Singapore for a \$6.5 million loss. At 4050 Wilshire there was parking for at least 300 cars, but at 770 Wilshire taxpayers are paying to rent 125 spaces from Macys for \$275,000 a year.

3. In 2004, she voted to spend \$21.3 million of taxpayer money to buy and renovate the building at 770 Wilshire Boulevard. Of the \$21.3 million, \$1.8 million was spent on the renovation.

4. In 2005, she accepted \$1000.00 pay for each of multiple

STATE BUDGET DEADLINE LOOMS

This year Republicans in the State Legislature announced those three little words: "No New Taxes." I know this might not seem like big news – Republicans, against taxes – but considering budget negotiations are underway, it is an important declaration.

Most bills only need a majority vote to pass through the State Legislature, which isn't difficult for the liberal agenda. Because Democrats outnumber Republicans in both houses, Republicans matter most when the two-thirds majority requirement is invoked – like when government wants to raise taxes or pass the State Budget. Any tax increase or proposed budget that has the support of every Democrat still requires the endorsement of six Republicans in the Assembly and two in the State Senate.

Unfortunately, for all of us, the Democrats have stolen a page out of David Copperfield's magic tricks by adopting a loose definition of "fees" to disguise taxes and therefore circumvent the two-thirds vote requirement for certain legislation. But, in spite of their "abra cadabra," they won't be able to pass a State Budget with tax increases.

A State Budget that increases taxes would add to a tax burden that already ranks as the seventh-highest in the country. Californians work more than four months out of the year to earn enough income to pay for taxes. The other eight months they work to pay for everything else – health

care, housing, food, transportation, etc. Enough is enough.

June 15 marks the statutory deadline to pass a State Budget. In the past five years, the State Budget's general fund revenues have grown by 32% - from \$76.8 billion to more than \$100 billion. However, general fund expenditures have not only grown on pace but have surpassed revenues in that same time frame. This year alone we are projecting \$101.3 billion in revenue but are planning to spend more than \$103.1 billion.

The Governor used to say, "We don't have a revenue problem; we have a spending problem." I say we have a basic math problem: We shouldn't spend more than we have – not by a dollar, not by two billion.

Especially considering next year we can expect an additional \$7 billion shortfall with larger deficits looming. This is why we can't afford to raise taxes, grow government or fail to balance the budget. With a decline in the housing market, a slowing state economy and a serious public pension crisis on the horizon, we must be responsible now.

No matter how hard the Democrats push, they won't get me to budge for tax increases to pay for increased government spending – whether it is in a bill or in the budget. That would require a magic trick that even David Copperfield hasn't mastered

HR 1645 Jeff Flake R-AZ and Luis Gutierrez (D-IL) introduced **STRIVE Act** of 2007 (Security through Regularized Immigration and a Vibrant Economy). This bill offers amnesty to 30 million illegal aliens already here and provides a steady flow of illegal alien guest workers 400,000 to 600,000 per year for the greedy big business.

Nathan Deal (R-GA.) has introduced **H.R. 1940, the Birthright Citizenship Act of 2007**, which would end the process of granting automatic birthright citizenship to the babies born in the United States to illegal aliens. Referred to as "anchor babies," these children born in the United States are one of the most prominent causes of illegal immigration and, subsequently, excessive population expansion.

Elton Gallegly (R-CA) has introduced **H.R. 133 "To amend the Immigration and Nationality Act to deny citizenship at birth to children born in the United States of parents who are not citizens or permanent resident aliens."**

A bill for this purpose has been introduced in nearly every session of Congress for the past 10 years, but for some reason it never became law. In the last session it had 87 co-sponsors but it

did not become law. Please contact your U.S. Representative and encourage him to sign H.R. 133.

H. Con. Res. 22 Virgil Goode (R-VA), "Expressing the sense of Congress that the President should provide notice of withdrawal of the United States from the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA)." This is the most important piece of legislation in the last 10 years. We have lost millions of jobs and manufacturing plants since NAFTA passed many years ago. It is the reason we have millions of illegal aliens in our country.

He also introduced **H. Con. Res. 40** "Expressing the sense of Congress that the United States should not engage in the construction of a North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA) Superhighway System or enter into a North American Union with Mexico and Canada. In the **Security and Prosperity Partnership** www.spp.gov This website has been updated **SPP Myths vs Facts** to make it look better and to deceive the citizens.

"Community" is sometimes called "space" but the Council of Foreign Relations goal is clear: "a common economic space ... for all people in the region, a space in which trade,

Board of Trustees meeting she missed, and continues to do so.

5. In 2006, she voted to spend \$5 million more to further renovate the building at 770 Wilshire Boulevard.

6. She now says that it is a waste of taxpayer dollars to have the May 15, 2007 election against Roy Burns. She is also NOT available to debate Roy and will NOT return calls to the media.

7. Many administrators predict that Georgia Mercer will do more damage if she is reelected feeling that she will author Bond Measure AAA for \$700 million for passage in 2008.

8. The enrollment in the nine campus district has dropped from 180,000 to 140,000.

9. The student failure rate has risen from 10% to 51%.

10. Faculty salary has risen by 20% with productivity down 30%.

11. Vocational-technical instructor's time spent with students has been reduced from 24 hours per week to 18 hours per week even though the pay is for 30 hours per week. The one hour per week of instructor conference time has been eliminated.

12. George Spear, the senior auto instructor at Los Angeles

Trade-Tech, has stated that the vocational programs have been reduced to industrial arts, and it now takes students two and a half years to finish the two year programs. Republican George Spear will confirm his statement and can be reached at (213) 763-3908.

13. Many district-wide alumni no longer send their sons and/or daughters to the college they graduated from. A classic example is Robert and Christine Wong, who own a thriving Mercedes-Benz repair business called Silver Star Service in Monterey Park. Their sons and daughters have graduated from either Rio Hondo or Citrus Community Colleges.

White House New Plan for Immigration Reform According to Federation for American Immigration Reform (FAIR), Fair states “The proposal seen only by key members of Congress and their staff, is meant to provide an overhaul of current U.S. immigration policy, but in reality only creates a complex and deceptive scheme to grant amnesty to millions of illegal aliens and to import hundreds of thousands of guest workers. FAIR's report states that “The first guest worker program gives amnesty to illegal aliens by first granting them legal status through “Z” visas. Illegal aliens who obtain Z visas will be able to renew their visas indefinitely, will be required to pay \$ 2,000 every three years they work in the country, and will

be allowed to apply for green cards. Like the Flake-Gutierrez bill, the plan incorporates a “touchback” requirement for green card applicants but only heads of households would have to make a token trip and the Z visa would guarantee them the right to re-entry... Those who decide to seek citizenship through this program would be required to pay an initial \$ 2,000 fee, then additional \$ 8,000 upon receipt of their green card. As messed up as our Homeland Security is you can bet these people will never have to pay a dime. We have so destroyed the honor of this country, and have so cheapened the meaning, privilege and pride of being an American citizen that all of our ancestors who built, fought and died for this country must be rolling over in their graves.
