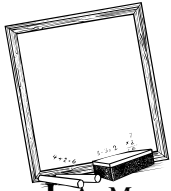

ON THE BLACKBOARD

Mayor's Goals

L.A. Mayor Villaraigosa wanted to take power over three LAUSD school clusters but he was blocked by the School Board. He went to Sacramento where Congressional friends passed a bill to make his takeover possible, but the court found it unconstitutional. So he backed School Board candidates whose wins give him a four-vote Board majority. If they give him power, will Thomas Saenz, his Chief Counsel and legislative adviser, influence his actions? After Prop 227 mandated English immersion classes and ended CA bilingual programs, Saenz filed a legal brief in 1998, claiming: "It will wreak unimaginable harm on 1.4 million who will suffer long-term, irremediable educational injury... Their life prospects will be shattered... This demonstrably violates the U.S. Constitution." So far, he has not expressed a change in attitude.

English immersion has improved student achievement in yearly tests. A new Edsource study reaffirms that fact. Based on last year's scores for English-language learners, LAUSD had some of the highest scores out of 237 school districts. Its English-language learners averaged 611 out of a possible 1000 points, compared with 649 for all students. Will the new LAUSD Board allow the Mayor and Saenz to resume bilingual programs?

Official English

Congressman Tom Tancredo (R) has introduced a resolution (H.J.RES.19) for a Constitutional amendment to establish English as the sole, official language of the U.S.

In contrast, Congressman Serrano (D) earlier proposed H. CON. RES. 11: "to recognize the importance of multilingualism to vital American interests and individual rights, and oppose 'English-only' measures." The battle is in full swing. Drivers' licenses, ballots and citizenship ceremonies are now being offered in dozens of languages. U.S. English, Inc. reports that 29 states have declared English their official language, and 18 more states have introduced similar legislation this year. Polls

show that 85% of Americans believe English should be our official language. Let your Congressman know your opinion on this important subject.

Dangerous Schools

Violence in schools has become too common, and Virginia Tech was a horrible example. The murderer was a mentally ill loner who allegedly converted to Islam. A heroic professor from Israel, a Holocaust survivor, gave his life to save his students. We need counselors in schools, K through college, to help students distinguish right from wrong. Too much of our media, music lyrics and TV shows corrupt our young people. Disrespect for authority, whether government, police or parents, is on the rise. Schools used to teach values and respect for our country and fellow citizens. We need values more than ever. Often students are being politicized by partisan professors. Our school curriculums should impart the unique and wonderful things about the U.S., as well as point out our flaws. Students must learn more about U.S. history and our forefathers, in order to become good citizens and future leaders.

Today's Challenges

UCLA and other colleges are concerned about their number of minority and women students. Why aren't they more concerned about the findings of a study of literacy on college campuses? The study found that more than 50% of four-year college students and 75% of two-year college students lacked the skills to perform complex literacy tasks, like understanding newspaper editorials, interpreting blood pressure tables, comparing credit card rates or summarizing survey results. They were weakest in matters involving math.

Still, the study revealed their average literacy is superior to that of adults nationwide. What does that portend for the nation's future? We need a highly educated workforce and population to deal with world competition and the sophisticated advances of today. We have to do better.

CONTRACTING OUT WOULD SAVE STATE TIME, MONEY

Last fall, the voters approved a record investment in our state's infrastructure future when they passed Proposition 1B on the November ballot. This historic plan gives the green light to \$19.9 billion in bonds to fund vital transportation infrastructure improvements across the state, to ease traffic gridlock and get Californians moving again.

Governor Schwarzenegger wants to stretch these critical infrastructure dollars to the fullest to get the most out of our investment. He has proposed contracting out some of the engineering and construction work on Proposition 1B projects to hire temporary, short-term private sector workers, so we can bring in important projects ahead of schedule and under budget.

Unfortunately, Democrats on the Assembly Budget Subcommittee on Transportation Finance have a different

agenda. Recently, they put partisan politics ahead of doing what's right for California, voting to deny the Governor the authority to contract out work on transportation infrastructure projects, instead forcing him to hire and train new full-time state workers to complete these projects, at a much greater cost to taxpayers.

Their partisan vote flies in the face of how regional transportation agencies across California routinely deliver on transportation improvement projects – they enter into public-private partnerships with experienced private engineering firms to get the job done. Consider the recent project to rebuild a collapsed Bay Area freeway that used a private firm to repair the heavily-damaged section far below cost and in record time.

IMMIGRATION

While the Senate is debating the **Comprehensive Immigration Reform Act (S. 1348) of 2007**, another much more devious bill has been coming into play. The new bill that now seems to be at the center of the immigration discussion is Senator Ted Kennedy's (D-MA) "**Secure Borders, Economic Opportunity and Immigration Reform Act of 2007.**" (The Kennedy legislation is in draft form only and has not yet been introduced in Congress, nor does it carry a Senate bill number.)

Kennedy's act has been termed the Kennedy-Bush bill as several months of closed-door negotiations led to a "Grand Compromise" on immigration reform. Hopes were high that the immigration reform bill would be quickly passed by the Senate, but public opposition has postponed a floor vote.

Similar to Harry Reid's (D-NV) S. 1348, Kennedy's bill would mandate an enhanced guest worker program, increase the number of student/worker visas, develop a biometric entry and exit system, as well as grant amnesty to 12-20 million illegal immigrants by placing them on a path toward citizenship.

Unlike S. 1348, however, Kennedy's legislation calls for the acceleration of the **Security and Prosperity Partnership of North America** (www.spp.gov). Section 413 of Kennedy's Immigration Reform Act reads:

The Presidents of Mexico and the United States and the Prime Minister of Canada, at their trilateral summit on March 23, 2005, agreed to promote economic growth, competitiveness, and quality of life in the agreement on Security and Prosperity Partnership of North America.

Even though the current language in S. 1348 does not carry the language of Kennedy's draft legislation at the present time, it could be added in as an amendment, or simply replace the current S. 1348 text with Kennedy's text.

The Senate is scheduled to convene on June 4 from their Memorial Day recess. A flurry of amendments can be expected to alter S. 1348 in many ways, whether in the form of Harry Reid's "Comprehensive Immigration Reform Act of 2007," or Ted Kennedy's newly drafted immigration legislation.

On May 29, President Bush encouraged Congress to send him an immigration reform bill as soon as possible. If Congress does pass an amnesty bill, it will result in far worse consequences than the counterproductive amnesty legislation of 1986. It would also pave the way for further development of the Security and Prosperity Partnership of North America.

It is up to the citizens of the USA to prevent another amnesty from successfully passing Congress, and becoming law by the swift push of the president's pen.

Please call your Congressmen and urge them to support Duncan Hunter's H.R. 563--The Congressional Pardon for Border Patrol Agents Ramos and Compean Act.

Who is Congress representing? Are they representing the constituents (citizens) of the United States of America or the illegal aliens who came illegally into our country and demand rights and benefits? Ask your pro-illegal Congressmen and Senators.

Plenty will be written on the Immigration bill. Instead, I'll focus on a few things going on behind the scenes. ..

The Contradictory Democrat Majority

The Promise: "We are pledging to uphold the highest ethical standards, the most honest, most open Congress in history." (*Nancy Pelosi, 1/5/07*)

The Action: "Democrats are wielding a heavy hand on the House Rules Committee, committing many of the procedural sins for which they condemned Republicans during their 12 years in power."

"On Wednesday, Democrats suggested changing the House rules to limit the minority's right to offer motions to recommit bills back to committee -- violating a protection that has been **in place since 1822.**"

"Democrats broke their campaign pledge to run a more open and honest Congress during their much-ballyhooed 'first 100 hours' in power when they introduced five bills on the floor without moving them first through committee or allowing Rules

Committee Republicans to dissent."

"... it contradicts the many campaign promises Democratic leaders made last year to run a cleaner, more open Congress." (*Politico, 5/17/07*)

The Copycat Democrat Majority

The "New and Improved" Lobbying Accountability Reform. Democrats' copycat proposal is similar to past Republican reform plans. In May 2006, 192 Democrats voted against H.R. 4975, the GOP's "Lobbying Accountability and Transparency Act." The Democrats will consider their own lobbying bill before the Memorial Day work period, and it is **substantially the same** as the Republican proposal last year.

Both bills:

Continue the current one-year prohibition of Members from lobbying Congress after they leave.

Require Members to disclose negotiations with potential employers to avoid conflicts of interests.

CONTRACTING OUT WOULD SAVE STATE TIME, MONEY

Tying the state’s hands when it comes to building new roads, bridges and highways will add great cost and tremendous delay to these important projects. Caltrans will now have to recruit, hire, and support the hundreds of new state workers necessary to perform the work required, adding months to project times and driving up long-term costs.

In taking this irresponsible action, Democrats actually claimed that using new full-time state workers would save taxpayers money. Nothing could be further from the truth. In fact, a report issued by the former nonpartisan Legislative Analyst William Hamm found that using temporary private workers would result in far lower costs to taxpayers than Caltrans could ever imagine. He found that contracting out allows projects to be completed faster, cheaper and at a higher quality, with less risk.

Finding fiscally-responsible ways to get the most out of California’s transportation bonds should not be a partisan issue. It is disappointing to see Democrats put the costly, irresponsible demands of union bosses and special interest groups ahead of the hard-working Californians they were elected to represent.

Partisan considerations should not stand in the way of completing the vital transportation improvement projects the people are demanding. I hope my colleagues will put politics aside and join with me to do what’s right for California.

BEHIND THE SCENES

Mandates quarterly, electronic disclosure of lobbyist activity to a public database.

Increase fines and criminal penalties for breaking lobbying regulations.

FLASHBACK: Copycat Democrats criticized the GOP bill last year. **Speaker Nancy Pelosi** “derided the bill as ‘a pathetic tiny little step that is a missed opportunity for a high ethical standard’ in the House.” (*New York Times*, 4/28/06) And **Majority Leader Steny Hoyer** called it an “empty shell of a bill.” (*AP*, 5/3/06)

Democrats are quick to backtrack on reform promises now that they are in the majority. Rank-and-file Democrats complained actually following through on their pledges would harm their ability to raise lobbyist cash and find lucrative employment after they left Congress.

Democrat “leaders scrapped a campaign pledge to double the current one-year ban on lobbying by departing lawmakers

and senior staff members. Democratic leaders in the House faced a rank-and-file revolt over the measure, which would significantly cramp the ability of lawmakers to cash in on their government service for million-dollar paychecks...” (*New York Times*, 5/18/07)

“They did this after a group of Blue Dogs, and members of the Congressional Black and Hispanic Caucuses threatened to torpedo the bill, contending that it would hurt their ability to earn money after they left Congress...” (*Politico*, 5/18/07)

Government watchdogs are slamming Democrats for breaking their campaign promises.

“It’s not a very impressive performance by the Democratic caucus that promised to make this Congress the cleanest in history,” said Craig Holman of Public Citizen. (*San Francisco Chronicle*, 5/18/07)

GOLDSTAR PARENTS CARAVAN TO WASHINGTON, DC.

Recently, June and Norm Shafer joined the growing numbers of military supporters, including many veterans from past wars, at Griffith Park. GoldStar Parents were on a 9-day publicized caravan from San Diego to Washington, D.C. The tour was called the NATIONAL SUPPORT OUR TROOPS TOUR. They were aiming to demonstrate to Congress the importance of fully supporting the military...in every way. We were to bring flags from home to contribute to the cause. Since every Friday is considered "support our military day," most everyone there wore red shirts, blouses, dresses, skirts, etc. It was a proud afternoon of the color red!
